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INTRODUCTION

Author of I Corinthians:

Paul, the apostle (I Corinthians 1:1, 16:21), formerly Saul of Tarsus (Acts 8-9) identifies himself as the author of this letter. There is little doubt he penned this epistle.

Date of I Corinthians:

It is generally accepted that Paul wrote it in the spring of 57 AD in the city of Ephesus (**I Corinthians 16:8**) during his third missionary journey (**Acts 19:1-41**). This was shortly before the Jewish feast of Pentecost (**I Corinthians 16:8**). It could have been written as early as 55 AD, but definitely during his three years in Ephesus, and coincided with his tenure at the school of Tyrannus (**Acts 19:9-10**).

Theme of I Corinthians:

The entire book is about maturity and dealing with difficult church issues. The problems at Corinth had reached the ears of Paul and the brethren in Ephesus. This message came from two sources: 1) the household of Chloe (I Corinthians 1:11), and 2) a personal letter (I Corinthians 7:1), delivered by Stephanas, Fortunatus, and Achaicus (I Corinthians 16:17). Paul recommends these men to the leadership of the church (eldership) to help the church seek balance. It is doubtful that they had elders, so Paul may be suggesting these three men to the congregation for ordination and sends his blessings (I Timothy 3:1-7, Titus 1:5-9).

Audience of I Corinthians:

The intended audience is the church in Corinth. Corinth was situated on the Isthmus of Greece (called Achaia in the Bible) between the Ionian Sea and the Aegean Sea (above the Mediterranean Sea). It was around 50 miles east of Athens. It was a newer city, with a population of less than half a million people from all kinds of cultures, mostly pagan. The temple of Venus (Aphrodite), was located there and it hosted 1000 priestesses dedicated to prostitution in the name of religion. The church was established during Paul's second journey (Acts 18:1-18).

The Geography of Corinth:

The city of Corinth is located on a narrow strip of land in Southern Greece (the "Bridge of Greece"). The city of Corinth was one of the main cities providing the ancient world with commerce. Ships from the east (Asia Minor, Syria, and Egypt) would port in Cenchreae. Ships from the west (Italy, Sicily, and Spain) would port in Lechaeum. To avoid Corinth, traders had to make a 200 journey around Peloponnesus (Cape Maelea). The flat terraces of land behind the city rose about 1,500 feet above the skyline.

The History of Corinth:

The city of Corinth in New Testament times was an ancient city (at least 800 BC). Corinth was destroyed in 146 BC but rebuilt thanks in part to Julius Caesar in 44 BC. The city was repopulated with Italian freed slaves, displaced Greeks, and other diverse cultures. The Roman government was located in nearby Achaia (Acts 18:12). Corinth was a leading city of Greece for both political and commercial reasons. It had the temples of Apollo, Aesculapius, Dionysus, Isis, Aphrodite, etc.

The Beginning of the Church in Corinth:

The Jews in Corinth were planted there because of the Dispersion. In Asia Minor there were many Jewish settlements, but this one seems to be unique. Luke records the early background of the church in **Acts 18**. Paul makes a very important contact with a man named Aquila and his wife Pricilla. Every Sabbath day he preached in the synagogue to both Jews and Greeks. Paul is rejected by the Jews and he decides to shift his focus to the Gentiles (**Acts 18:6-8**). Paul receives a vision that he should stay awhile in Corinth (1 1/2 years). He was instrumental in their growth and success.

The Work of the Church in Corinth:

The Bible and historical evidence prove the existence of a large congregation in Corinth. The work seems to be successful because of the message of God's grace to all people. The conversion of Titius/Titus (aka Justus) is a very important step. Paul did extensive work among the Gentiles after his rejection by the Jews (**Romans 16:23**). Paul would move to Ephesus from Corinth (**Acts 19**). The correspondence between Paul and the Corinthians.

The Dilemmas of the Church in Corinth:

The church suffered a setback with Paul's trial before Gallio. Gallio was governor of all of Southern Greece and brother of Seneca, a Roman philosopher. Historians have documented evidence that Gallio became proconsul in the Summer of 51 AD. The Jewish leaders hoped to separate themselves from the Christians. Sosthenes, the leader of the synagogue, is beaten for his association with Paul (I Corinthians 1:1). The church faced many heresies and conflicts. There were also several acute cases of "preacheritis" in the New Testament, and Corinth bears no exception to this dilemma. There is a Apollos party, a Cephas party, a Paul party, and a Christ party. The influence of Gnosticism is also seen in this congregation.

The Maturity of the Church in Corinth:

The church benefited when it was led by stable mature leaders. The congregation succeeded when Pricilla and Aquila were there leading them. Paul, Apollos, Peter, Titus and Timothy were also effective, but they needed stability. The church would have matured faster with good shepherds. It seems from I Corinthians 1-4 that they had no elders. The three men in I Corinthians 16:17 were sent to supply what was lacking (Titus 1:7). The church would have matured faster with solid preaching and effective shepherding. It seems that Apollos was discouraged with the brethren there, maybe for this reason (I Corinthians 16:12). Paul tells them in I Corinthians 16 Timothy will bring the next letter, but it was Titus who ended up going. Were the Christian missionaries avoiding this city and these brethren? If so, why? The church became a mature church when they heeded Paul's advice. This book was his "best shot" for the saints of God.

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Lesson #1 = Saints Can Overcome...
Problems Regarding Unity (I Corinthians 1)

<u>Introduction</u>: We are beginning a new series on the book of I Corinthians. The church in Corinth had many issues but we must remember that the apostle Paul called them "saints" (I Corinthians 1:2). He knew they could overcome their problems. I think we can learn from Paul's wisdom. We need to stop looking at our struggles and start searching for solutions. Today we will talk about how to overcome problems regarding unity. Open your Bible to I Corinthians 1. Let's read and study together...

Discussion:

I. What Is The Problem?

- Division over vision.
 - I Corinthians 1:1-9, Proverbs 29:18, Hosea 4:6
- Division over people.
 - I Corinthians 1:10-17, Matthew 16:18, Romans 16:16
- Division over message.
 - I Corinthians 1:18-31, Romans 1:16, Galatians 1:8

II. How Can We Overcome It?

• Define the church as a person.

I Corinthians 1:2, 10:32, 11:22, 12:28, 14:4-5, 14:12, 15:9, 16:19

- Define the church as a place.
 - I Corinthians 4:17, 11:18, 14:19, 14:23, 14:28, 14:34-35
- Define the church as a thing.

III. What Can We Learn?

- What is the first problem Paul deals with in this epistle? Why?

<u>Conclusion</u>: I want this lesson, and this series of lessons, to inspire and encourage all of us. We have got to stop looking at our struggles and start looking at solutions. The problem with the divisions in Corinth is that they could have been solved, if they would only look inside their hearts. The crux of the book will be chapter 13. Saints can overcome problems with unity! God can help us! Is your heart divided? Are you seeking unity within the body of Christ? We must remember that we are saints. We can overcome.



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Lesson #2 = Saints Can Overcome...
Problems Regarding Sensitivity (I Corinthians 2)

<u>Introduction</u>: Whether we like it or not we live in a politically correct society. People are often overly sensitive about people and subjects. In 2015 the University of New Hampshire published a "*Bias-Free Language Guide*" that identified 4,812 problematic words and politically incorrect words. This was NOT a joke, but meant to correct poor language choices (it has now been removed from the website). Unfortunately, other universities have followed this same pattern. Who determines what is politically correct? Is it possible to be too sensitive? Today we will talk about overcoming extreme sensitivity. Let's read and study together...

Discussion:

Not just loving ourselves, or others, but loving God! Jesus said, "*If you love me, keep my commandments*" (**John 14:15**). Saints can overcome problems with sensitivity. We need to redirect our hearts to think about God first. Is your heart divided? Are you seeking the will of God? We are Saints. We can overcome.

<u>Introduction</u>: This Sunday morning series on I Corinthians is entitled: "SAINTS CAN OVERCOME." Before addressing the problems in the Corinth... Paul called them "saints" (I Corinthians 1:2). He knew they could overcome their problems if they focused on positive things. Today we will talk about how to overcome problems regarding sensitivity. Today is Mother's Day! If anyone knows a thing or two about learning how to overcome, or handle, immaturity, it is our mothers! Please open your Bible to I Corinthians chapter 3. Let's read and study together...

<u>Conclusion</u>: The problems in Corinth were deep rooted, but they could be solved. They needed to grow up and act like mature Christians. Saints can overcome problems with immaturity. We need to redirect our focus toward growth. Are you a mature Christian? Are you patient with immature Christians? Are you seeking the will of God or yourself? We are Saints. We can overcome.

Problems Regarding Humility (I Corinthians 4)
