INTRODUCTION

Author:

The book claims to have been written by the apostle Simon Peter (II Peter 1:1). However, traditions about this are weak and conflicting. The language and style is different from I Peter. However, I Peter 5:12 reveals Silas and John Mark's influence in the first book. This may have been a more personal letter from his own hand and with influence from Jude (II Peter 2:1-3:4 is nearly a word for word quote of Jude 4-19).

There are those who feel that no other book in the New Testament is more hotly debated in reference to date and author. It should be noted that these things were debated before the book was placed in the NT canon and after 367 AD it was universally accepted, despite these arguments.

Many critics are also critical of other books, dates, and authors, just because they dislike accepting things as assumed so because of tradition. Being critical is not necessarily a bad thing, but it if takes the focus off of the message, then it becomes a distraction.

Date:

It is generally accepted it was written in the mid 60's AD. Some have ascribed 64-65 AD to the book, while others believe it to be closer to 66-68 AD. It is obvious it was written at the same time as the book of Jude, but there are differing views as to which came first.

Theme:

This book is about seeking knowledge. Peter previously commanded Christians to defend their faith (I Peter 3:15). This, of course, included knowledge (John 8:32). Faith is reasonable and is not a leap into the dark. Once this is understood we can see that false teachers can be successfully defeated by carefully examining the Scriptures (II Peter 2). The threat of false teachers at the time of 2 Peter had become a reality, which is also seen in the book of Jude. He reveals that some will attempt to "twist" the Scriptures (II Peter 3:15).

Peter hopes that Christians will see that they can know, beyond the possibility of error, that God exists and that the Bible is His Word (II Peter 1:20ff). The way to such knowledge is spiritual growth and maturity (II Peter 1:3-10). This is one of the reasons why he spends his last chapter dealing with preparing for the second coming and giving an account for our spiritual walk.

Audience:

The letter was intended for a general audience (**II Peter 1:1**). There is little doubt that he intended it for the exiled Christians in the Roman provinces of Asia Minor: Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia, and Bithynia(**II Peter 3:1**).

In this lesson, we will focus on the blessings of God. Let's study together. . .

<u>Introduction</u>: In this second letter, Peter hopes to strengthen the faith of Christians and further educate them on matters of the faith. Most of the topics we will discuss in this series are "meaty" and challenging, they are appropriate for the church today. We are facing some of the same difficulties now. In our last lesson we noticed the justice of God. In order to better understand the lesson for today let me point out four things: (1) Christians must be aware of the destructive heresies of false teachers, (2) Christians must be aware of the destructive words of false teachers, (3) Christians must be aware of the destructive methods of false teachers, and (4) Christians must be aware of the destructive partners of false teachers. In this particular lesson we will be studying the teaching of God, as expressed by those who speak the truth, and contrast it with false teaching. Are you ready to study words to the faithful? Let's study together.

Discussion:

I. True or False = What People Are Hearing (2:10-12)

- A. False teachers are selfish, teachers of the truth think of others first.

His first letter was meant to strengthen the faith of Christians, but the second was meant educate the brethren on matters of the faith. We have considered some "meaty" and challenging topics, but have seen the applicable nature for the church today. As we close out this series of lessons, I would like for us to study the peace of God. Are you ready to study words to the faithful? Let's study together. . . .

Discussion:

I. Peace Comes From Being Prepared (3:10-13)

- Jesus will return like a thief in the night.
- B. Jesus will return with calamity and destruction.
- C. Jesus will return for those who anticipated His coming.
- D. Jesus will return because of God's promise.

CONCLUSION

Christians in the 21st century are nearer our Lord's return than ever. Therefore, the book of second Peter has more than just eschatological value. Jesus may return during this century! Readers need to be more prepared now that they know Jesus' return is very close. Unfortunately, because of the Internet, tele-evangelist, and novelists many Christians have had their view clouded. They are unwilling or unable to discern truth from error because of false teachers. What can they do? Follow the apostle Peter's advice.

Peter is using not only is apostolic role, but his pastoral role in this book to shepherd his readers and prepare them for better living. Individual Christians and churches that want to grow can follow the same prescription for growth in faith that Peter gave in **II Peter 1:5-11**. Faith alone is not enough to please God. Adding to our faith is necessary. We must take action.

Believers need to be aware of false teachers and false prophets. Peter repeats an Old Testament theme that seems to be familiar to his readers. He emphasizes the "word of the prophets" of the Old Testament (II Peter 1:19-21) and the influence of the Holy Spirit on those who wrote the Bible. Consider II Samuel 23:2, Jeremiah 23:26, and II Timothy 3:16-17. False teachers plagued God's people in both the Old and New Testaments. Unfortunately they are still with us.

Finally, notice how Peter elevates the ministry and teaching of Jude. James, the brother of Jesus, was a significant leader in the Jerusalem church. Little is known of this other half-brother of Jesus, except what he wrote in his letter (the next to last book in the New Testament). Yet, Jesus teaching was so valuable to the apostle Peter that II Peter 2:1-3:4 is nearly a word for word quote of Jude 4-19. Not only were the brothers in agreement, but Peter must have intended to elevate Jude's ministry.

There is little time to delay. Jesus is coming soon! Now is the time to heed the advice of the apostle Peter. Now is the time to prepare for judgment. God will reward the righteous and punish the wicked. What will be your fate?
