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INTRODUCTION

<u>Author</u>: Paul, the apostle (**Philippians 1:1**), formerly Saul of Tarsus (**Acts 8-9**) identifies himself as the author of this letter. The early church unanimously accepted it as from Paul, but there are questions about the date and place of writing. This letter is considered to be one of the most loving, warm, and personal of all that Paul wrote.

<u>Date</u>: It is generally accepted that Paul wrote it around 60-62 AD in the city of Rome, while in a Roman prison (**Philippians 1:12-20**). This is why it is lumped with the other prison epistles (Ephesians, Colossians, and Philemon). He also wrote another letter to the Laodiceans (**Colossians 4:16**), unfortunately, Paul's letter to the Laodiceans has been lost (**I Corinthians 5:9**). We can see from the other Prison epistles the spirit that must have been reflected in that lost epistle.

There are a few who doubt whether or not Paul wrote it from a Roman prison cell, however, there are clues. For instance, in **Philippians 1:13** Paul mentions the palace guard and in **Philippians 4:22** he references Caesar's household. It also seems from his writing that wherever he was staying it was a long ordeal. Those who do question the location of the writing try to point to his time in Ephesus (**Acts 19-20**) or his imprisonment in Caesarea (**Acts 24-26**) as possible locations. However, we have no reference to an imprisonment in Ephesus and the imprisonment in Caesarea was further from Philippi than Rome.

<u>Theme</u>: This letter is about living a joyful Christian life. Paul is attempting to encourage his readers but also challenge their way of thinking. If we could choose to be a member of one of the New Testament congregations, we would probably choose Philippi. If we could choose to receive a letter, this would probably be it. This group seemed to embody the spirit of Christ. The church seems to have a spirit of love and generosity (**II Corinthians 8:1-5**) as it would have been a part of all the Macedonian churches described there.

Paul wanted the congregation in Philippi to know that he was experiencing trials but he got through them because of his faith and strength in Christ. Therefore, he has only praise for them and reflects a positive state of mind despite his imprisonment. The terms "joy" and "rejoice" appear sixteen times in this letter. In order to reveal the need for the church to have joy Paul evaluates his own life and circumstances (**Philippians 3:12-16**). He tells his secret of own contentment in Christ (**Philippians 4:10-13**). Paul was not perfect, and his life was not free of problems, but he found a way to rely on God no matter the circumstances (**Philippians 2:1-11**).



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<u>Audience</u>: The church of Philippi was the intended audience. The origins of the church are recorded in **Acts 16**. The church began because of the work of Paul, Silas, Timothy, and Luke because of the Macedonian call. Remember that Paul received a vision of a Macedonian man saying, "Come over and help us" (**Acts 16:9**). The missionary team had success early on with a ladies prayer group that met outside the city (Lydia). It should be noted that it was Paul's usual custom to go to the synagogue first, so why did he stray from that pattern (**Acts 13:14, 17:1-2**)? We really don't know, but it is assumed that there was not a synagogue in Philippi, and that the Jews in the city were already restricted from group assembly, and meeting on their own. Traditionally you needed ten men to start a formal synagogue so there may not have been enough men to form one yet.

The Jews were not embraced in Macedonia. The people in that region saw Yahweh as a foreign God. Some prominent Roman cities restricted worship to outside the city gates. There is a very interesting statement in **Acts 16:20-21** that hints to this fact. The mission team was accused of being Jews, or at least followers of a branch of Judaism, so they were advocating an illegal practice (and stirring up the locals over the slave girl).

By the end of their ministry in Philippi three households became the nucleus of a new congregation. There was the aristocratic family of Lydia (Acts 16:11-15), the middle-class family of the jailor (Acts 16:25-34), and the lower class slave girl (Acts 16:16-18). Within ten years this nucleus had become a full-fledged congregation with "bishops and deacons" (Philippians 1:1). On his first visit we see Paul casting out demons, and performing miracles, but ten years later he simply trusts in God for the recovery of the sick (Philippians 2:25-27). This should tell us something about the purpose and duration of miracles in the first Christian century and the maturity of the churches of Christ. He also commended two church leaders including Timothy who was a regular visitor, and Epaphroditus (the minister in Philippi).

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REASON TO REJOICE #1 = Unbreakable Fellowship (Philippians 1:1-18)

<u>Introduction</u>: We live in a world filled with sorrow, trials, and turmoil. God never expected us to get comfortable because this world is not our home! However, He does hope we will find joy. He said, "These things I have spoken to you, that My joy may remain in you, and that your joy may be full" (**John 15:11**). **Psalm 5:11** says, "But let all those rejoice who put their trust in You; Let them ever shout for joy, because You defend them; Let those also who love Your name be joyful in You." The book of Philippians is a great place to turn for some reasons to rejoice. The apostle Paul finds himself in a Roman prison, but he does not forget that God has called him preach, teach, and encourage the people of God. Therefore, he writes the book of Philippians and mentions the words "joy" or "rejoice" at least thirteen times. What advice did he give to that congregation? What can we learn? Let's study together...

Discussion:

Will you allow his message to change your attitude? Have you experienced the joy of salvation? Do you need to refill your joy cup? The Lord is ready to give you His joy, if you will receive it!



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REASON TO REJOICE #2 = Unsinkable Faith (Philippians 1:19-30)

<u>Introduction</u>: We live in a world filled with sorrow, trials, and turmoil. God never expected us to get comfortable in this world, but He does hope we will find contentment in Him. Jesus told His disciples He came to give everlasting joy. He said, "These things I have spoken to you, that My joy may remain in you, and that your joy may be full" (**John 15:11**). The apostle Paul finds himself in a Roman prison, but he does not forget that God has called him to preach, teach, and encourage the people of God. Therefore, he writes the book of Philippians and 13x he is going to mention the words joy or rejoice. What are the benefits of an unsinkable faith? Let's study together...

Discussion:

I. Unsinkable Faith Reflects on a Higher Prayer (1:19-20)

<u>Conclusion</u>: Paul is challenging us to endure all things through faith. He is urging us to have an unsinkable faith. Remember the story of Peter in **Matthew 14:22-32**? Why did Peter fail to walk on the water with Jesus? He didn't have an unsinkable faith. Not at that moment, but he would grow in his faith. In that moment, he let the turbulent waves and the storm distract him. He lost his focus on Jesus. Will you keep your eyes on Jesus? Will you allow Paul's message to change your direction? Have you experienced the joy of salvation? Do you need to refill your joy cup? The Lord is ready to give you His joy, if you will receive it!



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REASON TO REJOICE #3 = Unshakable Unity (Philippians 2:1-18)

<u>Introduction</u>: We live in a world filled with sorrow, trials, and turmoil. God never expected us to get comfortable in this world, but He does hope we will find contentment in Him. Jesus said, "These things I have spoken to you, that My joy may remain in you, and that your joy may be full" (**John 15:11**). On Sunday nights we are considering Paul's letter to the Philippians. Each week we are noticing some of the reasons he gave them to rejoice. So far in this series we have noticed how he told them to rejoice over unshakable fellowship and unsinkable faith. Next, let's see the benefits of unshakable unity. Let's study together...

Discussion:

What did Jesus hope for among His people? Unity. He wants us to stand united for the kingdom of God. Will you keep unity in the body of Christ? Will you allow Paul's message to change your heart? Have you experienced the joy of salvation? Have you been added to the family of God? The Lord has great plans for you! Will you stand in His way?



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REASON TO REJOICE #4 = Unshockable Ministry (Philippians 2:17-30)

<u>Introduction</u>: We live in a world filled with sorrow, trials, and turmoil. God never expected us to get comfortable in this world, but He does hope we will find contentment in Him. Jesus said, "These things I have spoken to you, that My joy may remain in you, and that your joy may be full" (**John 15:11**). On Sunday nights we are considering Paul's letter to the Philippians. So far in this series we have noticed unshakable fellowship, unsinkable faith, and unshakable unity. Now, we will focus on unshockable ministry. Let's study together...

Discussion:

The church family needs to be welcoming, inviting, and positive. Paul is urging us to rejoice, no matter the circumstances. Consider the ministry of Jesus. We are His hands and feet! Will we continue the ministry of Christ? Will you allow Paul's message to change your heart? Have you experienced the joy of salvation? Have you been added to the family of God?



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REASON TO REJOICE #5 = Unstoppable Zeal (Philippians 3:1-14)

<u>Introduction</u>: We live in a world filled with sorrow, trials, and turmoil. On Sunday nights we are considering Paul's letter to the Philippians. Each week we are noticing the reasons he gave them to rejoice. So far in this series we have noticed unshakable fellowship, unsinkable faith, unshakable unity, and unshockable ministry. In this lesson we will study about having an unstoppable zeal. Let's study together...

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REASON TO REJOICE #6 = Unbeatable Retirement (Philippians 3:15-21)

<u>Introduction</u>: We live in a world filled with sorrow, trials, and turmoil. We have been considering Paul's letter to the Philippians. Each week we are noticing the reasons he gave them to rejoice. So far in this series we have noticed how he told them to rejoice over unshakable fellowship, unsinkable faith, unshakable unity, unshockable ministry, unstoppable zeal... and now it's about an unbeatable retirement. Let's study together...

Discussion:

We have an unbeatable retirement plan, but the benefits are available now! **I John 5:13** tells us that John wrote his letter for one purpose: These things I have written to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, that you may know that you have eternal life, and that you may continue to believe in the name of the Son of God. Do you know you are saved? Have you taken the appropriate steps to salvation? Don't wait until it's too late. You can have a reason to rejoice tonight! Will you allow Paul's message to change your heart? Have you experienced the joy of salvation? Have you been added to the family of God? The Lord is ready to bring you into the body of Christ! Do you need to refill your joy cup? The Lord is ready to give you His joy, if you will receive it. Give your life to God!



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REASON TO REJOICE #7 = Unfathomable Peace (Philippians 4:1-9)

<u>Introduction</u>: We live in a world filled with sorrow, trials, and turmoil. On Sunday nights we are considering Paul's letter to the Philippians. Each week we are noticing the reasons he gave them to rejoice. We have noticed how he told them to rejoice over unshakable fellowship, unsinkable faith, unshakable unity, unshockable ministry, unstoppable zeal, and unbeatable retirement. Next we will notice unfathomable peace. Let's study together...

Discussion:

I. Unfathomable Peace Directs Us Toward Steadfastness (4:1-3)

<u>Conclusion</u>: Look again and consider Paul's words in **Philippians 4:4**: "Rejoice in the Lord always. Again I will say, rejoice!" This is the focus of this entire book. Two sisters needed to hear the message. The church family needed to hear it. And, we do too! Do you want everlasting peace with God? Are you ready for unfathomable peace? Then you need to give your life fully to God. Not just on Sunday or Wednesday or on special holidays, but every day! The peace of God can be in you and can go with you every day of your life! Do you need to refill your joy cup? The Lord is ready to give you His joy, if you will receive it. Give your life to God!



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REASON TO REJOICE #8 = Unmatchable Contentment (Philippians 4:10-23)

<u>Introduction</u>: We live in a world filled with sorrow, trials, and turmoil. On Sunday nights we are considering Paul's letter to the Philippians. Each week we have noticed the reasons we have to rejoice. We can rejoice over unshakable fellowship, unsinkable faith, unshakable unity, unshockable ministry, unstoppable zeal, unbeatable retirement, unfathomable peace, and finally we will see unmatchable contentment. Let's study together...

Discussion:

I. Love Brings Contentment (4:10-12)

Will you allow Paul's message to change your heart? Will you find contentment with God? Have you experienced the joy of salvation? Have you been added to the family of God? The Lord is ready to bring you into the body of Christ! Do you need to refill your joy cup? The Lord is ready to give you His joy, if you will receive it!
