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Lesson One: Without Love Miracles Are Nothing

<u>Introduction</u>: Jesus' words are clear throughout all of the New Testament, "If you love Me, keep My commandments" (**John 14:15**). Really this sentiment was echoed throughout the Old Testament as well, but it is made clearer in the New Testament. The disciples of Jesus tried to teach this to the church with the same zeal and enthusiasm. **I John 3:23** says, "And this is His commandment: that we should believe on the name of His Son Jesus Christ and love one another, as He gave us commandment." To believe in Jesus Christ and to love one another is the Lord's commandment for us today. The Christian life must be a life of faith and love. Over the course of the next few weeks we are going to study about the style of Christian love that Paul taught about in **I Corinthians 13**.....

<u>Today's Text</u>: **I Corinthians 13:1-2** says, "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I have become sounding brass or a clanging cymbal. And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing." (NKJV)

We place great value on the temporary gifts of the Holy Spirit, and they are valuable; but, if the early Christians did not exercise those gifts in love, they had no true value. We know that those gifts were essential in teaching people of the first century that the church was real.

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<u>Lesson Twelve : Love Will Make Us Mature & Give Us Knowledge</u>

<u>Introduction</u>: In last week's lesson we noted that in order to have Christian love we need to seek the perfection that love provides. In the remaining lessons we will continue to study about the style of Christian love that Paul taught about in **I Corinthians 13**....

Today's Text: I Corinthians 13:11-12 says, "When I was a child, I spoke as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child; but when I became a man, I put away childish things. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part, but then I shall know just as I also am known." (NKJV)

Discussion:

Paul has already noted that the miraculous spiritual gifts were only temporary and not completely necessary to build up the body of Christ after its early stages. He mentions that the lesser virtues will be put away. As long as we are in this flesh, we are like little children with limited knowledge, when we finally see Jesus face to face, and experience His love, we will finally become mature. When we are mature we will know all things that God has for us to know.

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<u>Lesson Thirteen: Love Is The Greatest of All Things</u>

<u>Introduction</u>: In last week's lesson we noted that in order to have Christian love we need to develop maturity. In this final lesson we will conclude our study about the style of Christian love that Paul taught about in **I Corinthians 13**....

<u>Today's Text</u>: **I Corinthians 13:13** says, "And now abide faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love." (NKJV)

Discussion:

Spiritual gifts are of no value in this life if they do not help to build up the church in faith, hope, and love. These greater realities have an eternal significance. Eventually faith will become sight (**II Corinthians 5:7**), hope will be fulfilled (**Romans 15:4-6**), but love will remain unchanged forever (**I Corinthians 13:13**). Love is God's purpose for all of His people (**John 13:34-35**).

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The Bible says, "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen" (**Hebrews 11:1**). This is why Paul has stressed love more than good works or spiritual gifts.
